Schedule

WJ Course of Study offers two sessions of two classes. In each session, one class is given in the morning and one in the afternoon. By taking both sessions, four classes can be taken. A year of study is four classes. Full time pastors generally take four classes annually. Part time pastors must take at least two classes annually.

Costs

Course of Study fees are \$210 for each class or \$840 for all four classes. Lunch on class days is included in the fees. There is also a \$25 non-refundable fee for registration and food. Additional costs are travel, housing, books, and meals beyond lunch.

COURSE OF STUDY CLASSES

FIRST YEAR

COS 121 Bible I: Introduction June 25-June 30, 1:00-4:30 pm Faculty: Rev. Dr. Susan Slusher Bell

This course introduces biblical interpretation. Attention is given to the inspiration, formation, and function of the canon and to the development of a methodology of interpretation that is consistent with the nature of scripture.

COS 122 Theological Heritage I: Introduction June 25-June 30, 8:00-11:30 am

Faculty: Bishop Dr. Grant Hagiya

This course will introduce the student to theological reflection in the Wesleyan tradition. Basic terms, tasks, and methods of Christian theology will be introduced. Representative classical themes will be defined and illustrated.

COS 123 Formation and Discipleship July 2-7, 8:00-11:30 am Faculty: Rev. Dr. Sheryl Kujawa-Holbrook

This course grounds the student in the theology and in the core practices of personal and congregational formation and of discipleship.

COS 124 Transformative Leadership July 2-6, 1:00-5:00 pm Faculty: Bishop Dr. Grant Hagiya

This course shapes the student's identity as pastoral leader and change agent in congregations, The United Methodist Church, and the world.

SECOND YEAR

COS 221 Bible II: Torah, and Israel's History July 2-7, 8:00-11:30 am

Faculty: Rev. Dr. Siliveinusi Moala Tiueti

This course interprets the critical events, the developing institutions, and traditions of Israel. Attention is given to the earliest Covenants, to the Exodus, to the rise of the monarchy, and to other events up to the eighth century prophets.

 $\underline{\mathrm{COS}}$ 222 Theological Heritage II: Early Church June 25-30, 8:00-11:30 am

Faculty: Dr. Catherine Tuell

This course focuses on the history and theology of the Church through the first five centuries. Using primary sources, students will reflect on significant individuals, events, and the articulation of the Christian faith during this period.

COS 223 Worship and Sacraments June 25-June 30, 1:00-4:30 pm

Faculty: Rev. Dr. Faith J. Conklin

This course examines worship within The United Methodist Church including liturgy, sacraments, and special and seasonal services. Attention will be given to the pastor's transformational role as a leader in worship. COS 224 Polity and Administration July 2-6, 1:00-5:00 pm Faculty: Rev. Dr. James Standiford

This course focuses on developing the student's competency as an administrator in a United Methodist congregation.

THIRD YEAR

 $\underline{\text{COS 321 Bible III: Gospels}}$ June 25-30; 8:00-11:30 am Faculty: Rev. Mark Kim

This course focuses on the content and message of the Gospels, as well as the theological perspectives of the Gospel writers. The practice of exegesis will be emphasized.

COS 322 Theological Heritage III: Medieval through the Reformation June 25-30, 1:00-4:30 pm

Faculty: Dr. Catherine Tuell

This course focuses on major movements and events beginning with the split between Eastern and Western forms of Christianity and continuing through the Reformation. Students will reflect on individuals, decisive events, and theological developments.

COS 323 Congregational Care July 2-7, 8:00-11:30 am Faculty: Dr. Nicholas Grier

This course introduces students to practices of congregational care and the pastor's responsibility in caregiving.

COS 324 Preaching July 2-6, 1:00-5:00 pm Faculty: Rev. Dr. Faith J. Conklin

This course focuses on the student's role as preacher and the practice of preaching the gospel from the Old and New Testaments.

FOURTH YEAR

COS 421 Bible IV: Prophets, Psalms, and Wisdom

<u>Literature</u> July 2-6, 1:00-5:00 pm

Faculty: Rev. Dr. Siliveinusi Moala Tiueti

This course examines God's Word as expressed through Israel's prophets, selected Psalms, and selected passages from Wisdom literature.

COS 422 Theological Heritage IV: Wesleyan Movement

July 2-7, 8: 00-11:30 am Faculty: Rev. Jared Maddox

This course covers the significant individuals, decisive events, and theology of the Methodist movement. It utilizes categories of grace, faith, and holiness.

COS 423 Mission June 25-30, 8:00-11:30 am

Faculty: Rev. Ron Hines

This course introduces the theology and scope of mission, and the pastor's role in leading congregations in their mission as agents of God's transforming redemption.

COS 424 Ethics June 25-June 30, 1:00-4:30 pm

Faculty: Bishop Dr. Grant Hagiya

This course introduces the biblical and theological basis for Christian behavior, emphasizing the pastoral skills needed for moral leadership in the congregation and community.

FIFTH YEAR

COS 521 Bible V: Acts, Epistles, and Revelation

June 25-30, 1:00-4:30 pm

Faculty: Rev. Mark Kim

This course focuses on the content and context of these writings, and the theological emphases of their writers. In addition to Acts and Revelation, Romans, 1 Corinthians, Hebrews, James, and 1 John will receive special attention.

COS 522 Theology in the Contemporary Church

July 2-6, 1:00-5:00 pm

Faculty: Dr. Marjorie Suchocki

This course covers significant individuals, movements, events, and theological developments from the nineteenth century to the present. Students will read selected primary sources

COS 523 Evangelism July 2-7, 8:00-11:30 am Faculty: Rev. Dr. James Standiford

This course introduces students to the theology and practices of evangelism as an expression of the mission of God.

COS 524 Theological Reflection on the Practice of

 $\underline{Ministry}\ \ June\ 26\text{--}30,8\text{:}00\text{--}11\text{:}30\ am$

Faculty: Rev. Belva Brown Jordan

This course is the capstone to the student's basic course of study. Its focus is the integration of the biblical, theological, and practical aspects of ministry.
