Chit Chat with Cheryl

It is that time of year when some churches are experiencing the Methodist Church tradition of moving pastors to new assignments. Below is an explanation of this tradition and why Methodist churches still adhere to this practice.

"Our unique system of deploying clergy has its roots in the earliest days of Methodism. John Wesley, the founder of the Methodist movement, preached up to 40,000 sermons in his lifetime. He was an "itinerant" preacher, traveling from town to town in England, setting up Methodist societies.

"John Wesley believed that itinerant preachers who moved from place to place were more effective than those who settled in, grew comfortable, and wore out what they had to say," says the Rev. Belton Joyner.

In a <u>letter to the Rev. Samuel Walker</u> in 1756, Wesley wrote, "We have found by long and consistent experience that a frequent exchange of preachers is best. This preacher has one talent, that another; no one whom I ever yet knew has all the talents which are needful for beginning, continuing, and perfecting the work of grace in a whole congregation."

In the early days of Methodism in America, a pastor — most often a <u>circuit rider</u> — might be appointed to half of a state or more. His appointment might be for only three months, after which he moved to another circuit. Thousands of the oldest United Methodist congregations today trace their history to a circuit rider.

These riders traveled from place to place to begin Methodist societies. Eventually, especially after the establishment of the Methodist Episcopal Church in 1784, most of these societies became congregations. This practice continued and became the basis for the itinerant system The United Methodist Church uses today. United Methodist pastors are sent, not called or hired. "Itinerancy" refers specifically to the commitment by pastors to go and serve wherever their bishops send them. "Appointment" is the action taken by bishops. These are different, yet related.

Clergy in The United Methodist Church commit to serve where their bishop appoints them. Appointments are typically for one year at a time, though the bishop may move any itinerant pastor at any time. The goal of the appointment process is to match as much as possible the gifts and graces of the particular pastor or deacon with the ministry needs of a particular congregation or ministry setting. In this "serial leadership" of consecutive pastors and deacons — no two are alike — over time, the combination of skills blends to form a broad base of developed ministries.

While bishops make appointments, they incorporate a consultative process outlined in The Book of Discipline that includes district superintendents, clergy and pastor/staff parish relations committees. The needs and desires of clergy are considered, but the mission of the church comes first. Joyner explains, "In a connectional system such as United Methodism, the question from any individual congregation or from any individual [clergy] is not, 'What is best for me?' The question is 'What is best for us, the whole connection?' The one who has oversight, the bishop, makes those decisions. (The New Testament word for bishop is episkopos, which means 'the one who can see the whole picture.')

"The changing of pastors brings different and often-needed gifts to the local church (1 Cor. 12:4). The changing of settings can keep a pastor refreshed. The missionary journeys of Paul are surely a reminder of that (for example, Acts 13:2-14:7; 15:36-18:22; 18:23-21:19)."



We Are Commissioned

The Easter story makes me laugh. It's so relatable to women leaders in the church.

Consider the scene at dawn on Easter morning. All four Gospels record the story, and each Gospel lists women as the discoverers of the empty tomb. Matthew says it was Mary Magdalene and "the other Mary." Mark's account is similar: Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James and Salome. Luke simply states "the women" went to the tomb but later explains that Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James, Joanna and several other women told the apostles what had happened. John notes only Mary Magdalene.

The writers didn't get their stories straight about which women were at the empty tomb—but they agreed that it was definitely women.

For Jesus' followers, surely that morning was one of confusion and despair. Their teacher, their hope, had died a gruesome death right in front of them. Where was the kingdom he had promised? Where was the peace he was to bring? How could they spread Jesus' teachings now that their own lives were in danger?

Then enter the women declaring that Jesus' body is gone. How will the disciples explain that?

Luke says Peter rushes to the tomb to see for himself. John says Peter and John need to verify the women's news. It wasn't good for the credibility of the movement to rely on the word of women. And yet the angel, or Jesus himself, depending on the account, appeared first to the women.

That empty tomb was an important moment in the new movement to be called Christianity. "Go to my brothers and say to them, 'I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God,'" Jesus tells Mary Magdalene after appearing first to her on the first Easter morning (John 20:17). And she did just that, becoming the first person to proclaim the good news of the Resurrection. Her role even earned her the title of the "Apostle to the Apostles" from theologian Hippolytus of Rome.

The Easter story speaks especially to us women in ministry. It reminds us that Jesus is doing a new thing, bringing new life all around us, and we get to witness that work and be part of it. Even if we're overlooked, even if others can't remember our name, we are important to the work God is doing in the world. God calls women to mighty works.

When I read the Easter story, I laugh because though the world misleads us, God's truth prevails. Though the world tells us we don't matter or that we're less-than, God says otherwise. Though the accounts of which women were at the tomb may vary, we know that news of the Resurrection was first given to women.

I laugh with joy as I think about God's daughters persevering in tough situations, living out the call God has given us and letting the Holy Spirit to move in us, strengthen us and compel us to be the people God created us to be. Happy Easter.
