September - December Meetings

We meet the second Saturday of each month, board and regular meetings. We have 30 members right now. We have had a busy fall, with two fundraisers.

- Our UWiF "Hooked on Books", directed by Karon Keeler, meets monthly and continues to do well.
- September; Vicki Scott gave the program, "Suzanna Wesley, Her Remarkable Life".
- October: We discussed and planned our "All Souped Up" Fundraiser. 10-12 ladies signed up to make 6 quart-size soup recipes. We made Chili Beef, Vegetarian Chili, Chicken Vegetable with Rice, and Vegetable Soup. All soups made with the same ingredients, so buyers would know. Each lady made 6-10 quarts, froze them and brought them to church on Sat. and Sunday, after church to sell. Each quart sold for \$10. We made \$670.00. All \$\$ will go to mission.
- November: We planned for our annual "Cookie Walk", Dec. 2nd. This year, each buyer could pick their own cookies, already packed in bags with 4-6 cookies. They would fill a box with cookies they chose. Each box sold for \$15.00. We had 20 + women donate 104 dozen homemade cookies, approximately 1,200+ cookies. We made over \$1,000, which will go to mission.

We have a wonderful group of ladies who work very hard. We will have our Christmas Brunch on 12/16/23. We are looking forward to a busy but fun year, "Together, we're making the world a better place..."
